

What makes a Great FCCLA Service Project

Step 1: Meet a Community Need

- Reflect on what your community needs and discuss the importance.
- Research these issues including what kind of people you will be serving.
- What are potential ways to meet the need?

Step 2: Determine what activities your members have the ability to do so

- How many members in your group
- How much time do you have to devote to a project
- Determine how much support you have for your project (ex: parents, teachers, an organization, etc...)

Step 3: Develop a Plan and Prepare for Your Project

- Make a Learn (explore your values), Lead (use leadership skills to transfer into the project), Serve (serving the needs of others and developing community based service) project goal.
- Find out what materials you are going to need.
- Figure out your projects when, where, and who.

Step 4: Carry out Your Project

Remember to document your project through pictures!

Step 5 : Reflect and Summarize Your Project

- Describe what happened, and how those you were helping felt
- What did you like about the project?
- What was the best part of your project?
- Would you make any changes to the project
