2026 State Conference Overview Information

Costs:

- **\$125** per person registration (includes T-shirt, dinner on Saturday, and access to all conference workshops/entertainment and other offerings)
- **\$135 (\$156.63 after tax)** per hotel room per night for single, double, triple and quad occupancy. You can do up to four in a room. With 4 in a room, staying for both nights, it's \$78.32 per person.
- Other costs to plan for:
 - *Adviser breakfast Ticket (\$20)
 - *State Officer Dinner Ticket (\$40)
 - Meals outside of Saturday's large group dinner (fast food options close by)
 - Out of room block fee (\$60 per person - if attending the conference and not staying in the hotel room block).

Register:

- Once open (by February 9), go to <https://www.registermychapter.com/fccla/mn> and complete registration by **February 23**.
 - Make sure your competitors are setup in the correct events and levels
 - Sign up students to showcase their talents on the big stage (select Talent Showcase the same as you would a STAR event)
 - Sign up students for STAR Events
 - Sign up students for Competency Events (formerly Skill Events) – no regional qualification needed – straight to state!



- Designate students for service project Fair and Parade (no chapter limits, can do multiple boards per school, each school encouraged to do at least one)
- Sign up for extras including the Adviser Breakfast, Painting Class, Talent Show (same as a competitive event)
- Nominate students for New Member and Chapter Spark Awards

- Complete the [FCCLA Room Block form](#) by **February 23** and email it to jennifer.jensen2@hilton.com, include FCCLA and your schools name in the subject line

Service Project Fair: We want members who can speak to the service projects done throughout the year. These representatives will share their boards and project stories in the Grand Ballroom Foyer just prior to the Opening Session. This will give members and chapters an opportunity to ask questions, learn some new best practices, and get ideas and inspiration for next year. We want to encourage each chapter to have at least one board and Service Fair/Parade rep but welcome multiple – we have lots to celebrate! 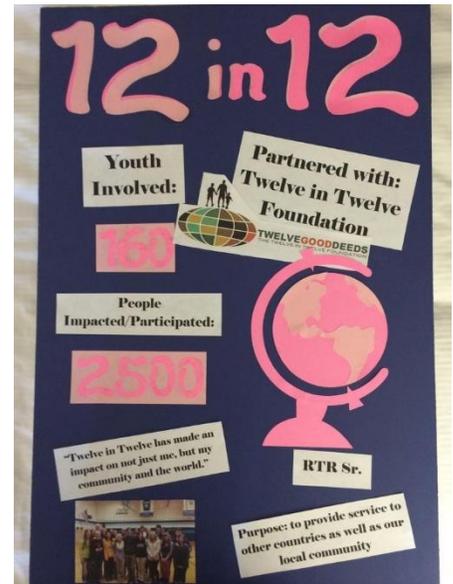
Service Project Poster Parade: Towards the beginning of the opening session, a representative from your group will “parade” the poster through the audience and place it in the display area. Designate a representative to do this in your conference registration– this person will gather at the back of the ballroom until it is time for the “parade”. You may designate the same person to serve as a host during the Service Project Fair but should have someone responsible for both.

Poster Guidelines:

- One Sided Only on regular size foam or poster board.
- Make it attractive! Use colorful letters, photos, etc.
- Chapter name and project name should be at least 2.5-3 inch letters.
- Do not use handwritten text on your poster – everything should be printed or cut out.

Things to Include on your poster:

- Chapter name
- Service Project Titles
- Photo of the project if possible
- Print outs of applicable icons/images
- On the front or back:
 - Partners for your project (for a example a business that supported you, took your donations....)
 - Participant names
 - # of persons impacted (involved in making the project happen and helped by the project)

Competitive Events

Competitive Events are the backbone of State Leadership Conference season. Encourage members to review rubrics and Midwinter Meeting notes and polish up displays and speeches ahead of the big weekend. Be sure to look in the FCCLA portal for the most up to date rubrics and materials. With hard work and some luck, your students may leave with STAR Event medals or even a National Advancer medal (new this year – awarded to individuals placing in the top 2 – for most events with some allowing for 3).

Each Adviser is expected to assume a Lead Consultant role. You should will receive communication around this as well as a link to a google drive folder sharing those resources. A Zoom training will also be held for Judges and Lead Consultants, recorded and posted, in addition to an onsite orientation. Be sure to take in all these resources and help us support over 600 student competitors across over a hundred events. Beyond stepping up into your Lead Consultant role, help us find Adult and Student judges. We can't do this without you!

Awards

The State Leadership Conference is about much more than competitive events, personal growth, and professional development... We have a lot to celebrate! During the awards ceremony on Saturday, we will recognize Chapters, Advisers, Student Leaders, Alumni and Administrators for their work and contributions to FCCLA throughout the year.

MN FCCLA Outstanding Chapter Award

We are happy to bring back the Outstanding Chapter Award this year. The Minnesota FCCLA Outstanding Chapter Award recognizes chapters that demonstrate strong, well-rounded engagement across leadership development, service, competitive events, membership growth, and chapter programming. This award highlights chapters that go beyond basic participation and intentionally build meaningful opportunities for students to lead, serve, and grow.

Outstanding Chapters show consistent effort across the year, create positive chapter culture, and connect FCCLA programming to real impact in their schools and communities. This recognition is designed to celebrate chapters that are not only active, but purposeful in how they develop student leaders and carry out the FCCLA mission.

There are different levels of achievement, bronze through gold, under the award as well as different thresholds for smaller and larger chapters. Regardless of where your chapter stacks up this year, we strongly encourage you to complete the form and celebrate your year-long achievements. MN FCCLA Member Awards

The **New Member Award** goes to a first-year member who dove into FCCLA; showing up, trying new things, learning fast, and being a strong teammate. The **Chapter Spark Award** recognizes a member who consistently brings positive energy and lifts others up. They build excitement, encourage participation, and show up with a can-do attitude that helps the whole chapter thrive. Each chapter may nominate 1 person each for these awards and should write those names in during conference registration due February 23.

The **Ultimate Leadership Award** is MN FCCLA's highest honor. It's adviser-selected and should go to one standout member who leads by example, builds others up, and stays fully engaged in FCCLA. Max one per chapter (no exceptions), and it's okay to nominate no one.. [A sample point system is available here](#). MN FCCLA Adult Awards

There is no limit on the number of nominations you can submit. Anyone may nominate someone for these awards, including students. There will be only one Spirit of Advising Award handed out, there maybe multiple other award winners. You can nominate the following awards here, <https://forms.gle/eqesuEiqMGTEg41d7> by Mach 3.

New on the Horizon: recognizes a new chapter adviser (years 0-3) who has embraced their role by building their group, supporting student leaders, and empowering members to grow through FCCLA programing, service projects, and or competitive events.

Spirit of Advising: recognizes chapter advisers who are constantly faithful to the organization, often quietly working behind the scenes to ensure the success of their students. This is the highest level of recognition at the State Level and winners will also be nominated at State. This nominee:

- Believes in the mission of Family, Career and Community Leaders of America
- Supports and works with students to ensure student success
- Provides learning experiences
- Encourages positive character development
- Dedicates time and energy to nurturing student leaders
- Serves as a current FCCLA adviser

***Outstanding Administrator:** recognizes a principal, CTE coordinator or other administrator that has been particularly supportive of FCCLA.

***Distinguished Alumni Award:** recognizes an alumni who has gone above and beyond in giving back to support MN FCCLA programming and or has made significant contributions in their chosen field.

Mentor Adviser: The Adviser Mentor Award recognizes advisers who have been successful in achieving Master Adviser Recognition, devoting two years to new adviser assistance, assuming adult leadership roles in FCCLA, conducting adviser workshops, attending training workshops, and using national and state FCCLA resources.

Educated Adviser: FCCLA recognizes the accomplishments of current chapter advisers of FCCLA who have gone above and beyond in their professional development activities and participation throughout the school year.

Master Adviser: Now obtained through the [Adviser Academy](#).

Adviser of the Year: The FCCLA Adviser of the Year Award, presented by U.S. Army, is the highest honor a chapter adviser can receive and aims to recognize and celebrate the dedication, leadership, and excellence of outstanding chapter advisers who have made significant contributions to the growth and success of FCCLA at the local, state, and national levels. This prestigious award is presented annually at the National Leadership Conference to acknowledge the critical role that advisers play in shaping the future of FCCLA Members.

Scholarships

Last year we were honored to introduce the Lori Henry Memorial Scholarship, and this year we're excited to add a second MN FCCLA-specific opportunity to help students attend National Leadership Conference: the Barb Barduson Scholarship. These two scholarships have different eligibility focuses, but both are designed to reduce cost barriers and expand access to NLC. Because these are Minnesota FCCLA scholarships, the applicant pool is much smaller — which means your odds of being selected are strong. There are also several excellent national FCCLA scholarships available, so we encourage members to explore and apply for those as well.

MN FCCLA Scholarships

The Lori Henry Memorial Scholarship helps Minnesota FCCLA members attend the National Leadership Conference (NLC) by covering registration, air fare, and hotel (valued at \$1,300). This scholarship is open to any MN FCCLA member with two years of FCCLA experience (can be finishing their second year). Financial need is considered as part of the selection process, along with FCCLA involvement and community engagement.

The Barb Barduson Scholarship honors Barb Barduson's legacy by investing in the next generation of Minnesota FCCLA leaders. This scholarship is reserved for students stepping into state-level leadership; incoming Area Officers, Peer Educators, or State Officers.

The scholarship covers conference registration (Ultimate NLC package and MN Package), supporting students as they begin their leadership journey and represent FCCLA across Minnesota.

State Conference - Peer Educator Candidate Process:

- Develop a 30 minute workshop outline for a National Program or related topic using this [FCCLA Workshop Planning Guide](#)
- Take the Peer Educator Test -Friday, March 27 at 12pm
- Hand in your Workshop Planning Guide and give a brief (10 minutes, 5 minutes for questions) overview of your proposal as your Peer Educator Interview - Friday, March 27th starting at 12pm



- Find out if you've been selected by the election committee at the Candidate Letter Drop - Saturday, March 28th at 4:15pm
- Attend New Candidate Orientation - Saturday, March 28 at 4:30pm

State Conference - Area Officer Candidate Process:

- Take the Area Officer Test -Friday, March 27 at 12pm.
- Give a short speech, 1-2 minutes, for the topic (**COMING SOON**) at the Area Meeting on Saturday, March 28th at 9am. Candidates are encouraged to memorize their speech or use limited notes on index cards.
- Answer a short question or two during the Area Meeting on Saturday, March 28th at 9am.
- Find out election results at the Candidate Letter Drop - Saturday, March 28th at 4:15pm.
- Attend New Candidate Orientation - Saturday, March 28 at 4:30pm.

State Conference - State Officer Candidate Process:

- Develop a 30 minute workshop outline for a National Program or related topic using this [FCCLA Workshop Planning Guide](#)
- Take the State Officer Test -Friday, March 27 at 12pm
- State Officer Interviews, between 12pm-2pm (exact schedule shared with candidates closer to the conference) on Friday, March 27
- Hand in your Workshop Planning Guide at your interview and give a brief (10 minutes) overview of your proposal at your scheduled interview time on Friday, March 27
- Give a short speech, 1-3 minutes, for the topic (**COMING SOON**) at the Opening Session at 4:30pm on Friday, March 27th. This speech should be memorized.
- Prepare a short impromptu speech based on a prompt given Friday evening and answer questions from voting delegates after, at 12pm on Saturday, March 28th

- Parking – If parking a bus/trailer, park in the back of the lot to not take up multiple spaces closest to the building

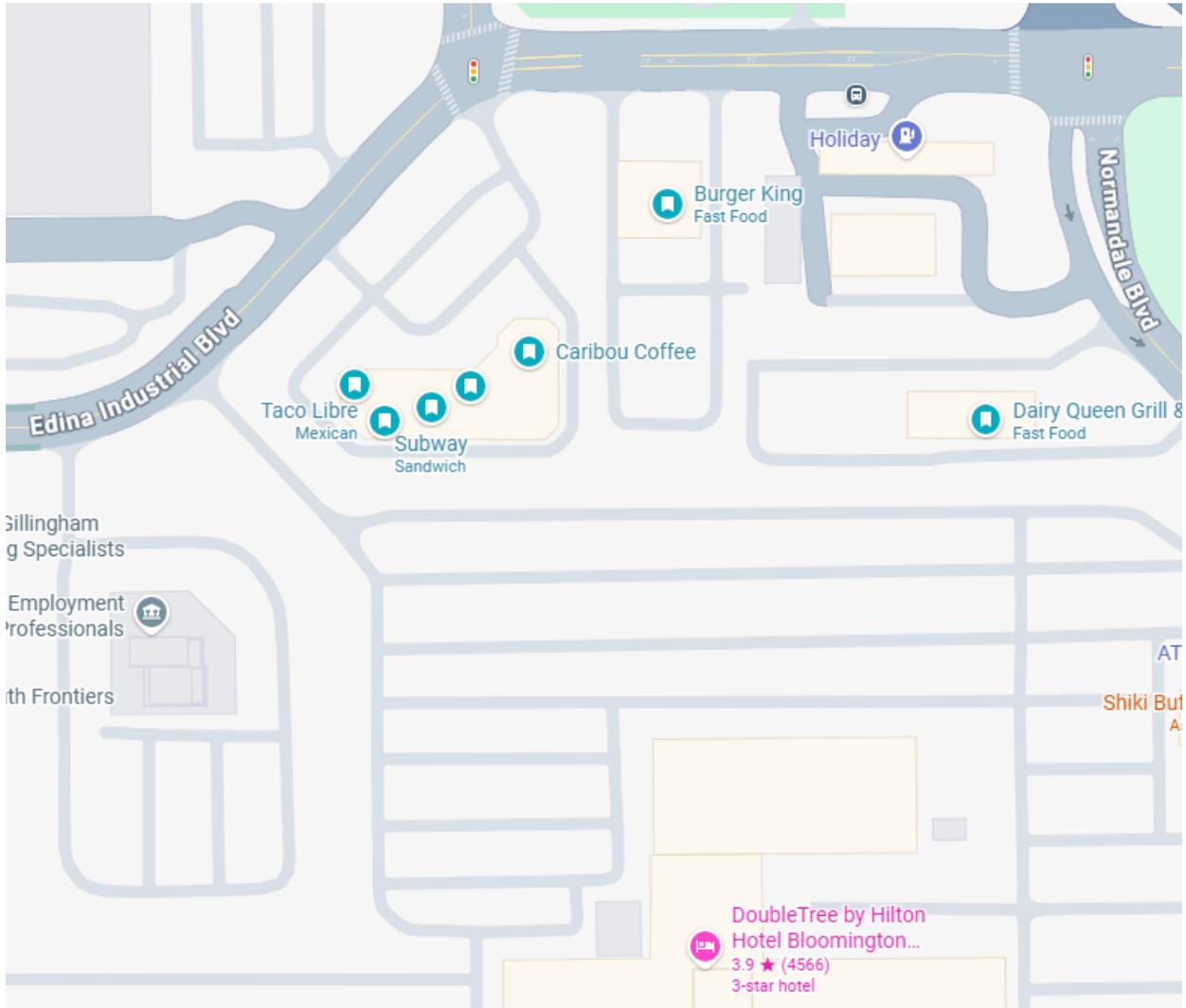
Food Guide

Dress Code

General guidelines:

- Student dress should contribute to the positive, professional image of FCCLA.
- STAR Events participants are expected to adhere to the published dress code for all general sessions, and workshops. No costumes.
- Unacceptable attire:
 - Anything that could be considered as not school appropriate
 - Clothing with printing that is suggestive, obscene, or promotes illegal behavior
 - Shorts outside of the gym or pool
 - Jeans, athletic clothing, leggings or sweatpants

For Everyone

- Clothing should fully cover your chest, stomach, and back
- Outfits should allow you to sit, stand, and walk comfortably
- When in doubt, choose something more modest and classic
- Black, white and red are encouraged but not required

For Dresses/Jumpsuits

- Dresses/jumpsuits must be **full length**
- No low-cut tops or deep V-necks
- No low-back dresses/jumpsuits
- No cutouts on the sides, front, or back
- No high slits
- Fabric should not be see-through
- Straps should be secure (no strapless or very thin straps)

For Suits

- Dress shirts are required (no t-shirts)
- Shirts should be buttoned appropriately
- Dress pants are required (no jeans or joggers)
- Dress shoes or clean formal shoes only (no sneakers or slides)
- Jackets or blazers are preferred

Shoes & Accessories

- Shoes should be formal and secure
- Accessories should be simple and appropriate for a formal event

Friday Afternoon:

- State and Area Officers – Official Dress
- Delegates-*Business Casual or Business Professional*

Examples of business casual:

- Top: Business style shirt like a button up collared shirt, polo, blouse, or sweater. Red, black, or white strongly encouraged.



- Bottom: Business style pants such as khakis, dress pants, or chinos. Business style skirts or dresses. Shoes: Business style shoes (non-athletic)

Friday Evening: After opening ceremony, not including STAR Events

- Delegates- *Semi Casual, Business Casual or Business Professional*

Examples:

- Top: Casual and school appropriate. FCCLA t-shirts are fine.
- Bottom: Business style pants such as khakis, dress pants, or chinos.
- No shorts outside of the pool/gym. Shoes: No flip flops outside of the pool.

Saturday Morning and Afternoon:

- State and Area Officers – Official Dress
- Delegates-*Business Casual or Business Professional*

Examples:

- Top: Business style shirt like a button up collared shirt, polo, blouse, or sweater. Red, black, or white strongly encouraged.
- Bottom: Business style pants such as khakis, dress pants, or chinos. Business style skirts or dresses. Shoes: Business style shoes (non-athletic)

Saturday Evening: Dinner, Academy Awards & Dance!

Delegates can dress fancy if they are so inclined with school-appropriate formal/ semi formal wear or stay with the above-described Business Casual/Business Professional dress.

Sunday:

- State and Area Officers – Official Dress
- Delegates- *Semi Casual or Business Casual or Business Professional*

Examples:

- Top: Casual and school appropriate. FCCLA t-shirts are fine (you just got one with registration!).
- Bottom: Dress pants, khakis, or chinos.

Business Session

This year we will have a business session with proposed Bylaw amendments for voting delegates to consider. The board is finalizing details within those proposals and will circulate the final proposed amendments at least 30 days prior to the meeting.
